## Coastal erosion on the increase in 2023

Huge storms **13a** \_\_\_\_\_ the world are causing coastal erosion at a faster pace than ever **14a** \_\_\_\_\_. In February, New Zealand suffered the worst storms in their history. Many houses close to the sea were lost causing distress and suffering for many people. In the UK this year **15a** \_\_\_\_\_ the east coast of the country the erosion has led to buildings falling into the sea and houses needing to be demolished.

The famous Jurassic coastline pictured **16a** \_\_\_\_\_ on the south coast of the UK is under threat too. In the middle of the photo, you can see a pile of rocks that have fallen **17a** \_\_\_\_\_ the cliffs onto the beach. The Jurassic coastline is a World Heritage Site and is famous for the ancient rocks and fossils that are found there.

Coastal erosion is causing the wearing away and breaking up of rock along the coast. Powerful and destructive waves erode the coastline in a number of ways: sometimes air becomes trapped in holes and cracks on a cliff face. When a wave breaks, the air is trapped **18a** \_\_\_\_\_ water which weakens the cliff and causes erosion.

There can be little doubt that it is the change in weather **19a** \_\_\_\_\_ our planet that is causing the coastal erosion we are facing. In many countries governments are building sea defences to try and slow the erosion and protect the land.

## An amazing achievement

International Women's Day on the 8 March is celebrated all over the world. Greece, like so many countries, has examples of many women who are making a difference whether it's in politics, science, education, archaeology, philanthropy, business or sport. This past year it celebrated the achievements of the Greek mountaineer, Christina Flampouri.



The last few years have been challenging for us all, but as a result most of us have come to realise we need to seize the moment and live our lives to the fullest, enjoying as much as we can while we can.

It is true that most people get caught up in their daily routines and their family and work responsibilities, but there are always real-life success stories happening around us, that remind us that things can be possible if we put our mind to it.

A special example of a person – who does exactly what she loves and who has achieved something few others have – is Christina Flampouri. She is a Greek mountain climber who has received global recognition and praise for her courage and determination. She started climbing in 2014 and today, at the age of 31, she has managed to become one of the only 70 women in the world, who have successfully conquered the seven tallest peaks in all of the seven continents. Let's just think about what that means. Between 2016 and 2020, a mere five years, Christina climbed the highest mountains in Africa, Europe, Asia, Oceania, Antarctica, and North & South America. In achieving that goal, in May 2019, she climbed the highest peak in the world, Mount Everest in Nepal, Asia. Her final challenge was in January 2020 when she climbed Mount Vincennes, the highest mountain in Antarctica.

Christina lives in the western suburbs of Athens and works for a large company full-time. To achieve what she has, she must have faced and overcome challenges that many of us have never considered. To become the first and only Greek woman who has managed to set foot on the seven highest peaks in every continent of the world is an astonishing achievement. She is an inspiration to us all.

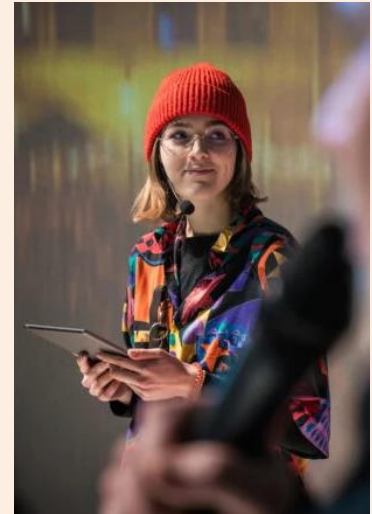


# Lublin in February – Things to do this winter in the European Youth Capital 2023

Get to know Lublin – The first Polish European Youth Capital! You might have not yet heard about this charming city which is the industrial and cultural centre for Southeastern Poland, but hey – you will hear a lot more about Lublin during this year.

February in Lublin, the European Youth Capital 2023, has kicked off with an out-of-this-world-event, the LubJam2023 gaming experience happening on 3-5 February. Imagine you have only 48 hours to design and launch a new software product. Challenge accepted. Young people from Lublin joined the 48-hour game jam to figure out how they can become game developers on their own.

Shall we move from gaming right to the business? Why not? As from 6 February, young people can submit their applications for the inter-university Lublin UP contest for the best business idea. This joint initiative is endorsed by the Lublin Municipal Office, the WeDo Foundation, and the Union of Lublin Universities. The contest will identify the best business concepts and ideas presented by the students of Lublin universities.



## Connecting with education & culture



Another exciting opportunity for the young people from Lublin is the Youth Inspires Districts programme. From 8 February until 13 March, everyone under 30 can submit ideas on innovative cultural initiatives. The winning concepts will be implemented in Lublin's Neighbourhoods thanks to freshly allocated funds. This cultural programme is open to all citizens aged 13-30 who live, study, or work in Lublin.

Early March will also be the best time to sign up for the Enterprising Youth project. Lublin-based schools that wish to enter the initiative should apply between 1-7 February. Later on, between 8-13 February, elementary schools are invited to register their interest in the Enterprising Kids project run in cooperation with the Maria Curie-Skłodowska University.



## From sports to culture

Between 16-19 February, Lublin will host the final games of the Suzuki Polish Basketball Cup and the opening of the long-distance Swimming Championships. This pool event known as AQUA Lublin will attract 250 competitors from the leading swimming clubs in the region. Those who prefer to train the brains over the body should enter a King Chess series of games organised by the Lublin Chess Club.



Moving on from sports to culture, February in Lublin will also be rich in cultural events, such as the National Contest for Young Vocalists. The city will also offer a lot of training opportunities, starting with the follow-up to the Leadership course in citizenship education and entrepreneurship organised with the Future Makers Forum.

Last but not least, the Lublin's European Youth Capital team cares a lot about young people's mental health. The city does not ignore the needs of professionals working with young people, either. The municipality will hold a conference in February, to talk about mental health and well-being challenges covering Behavioural Addictions among school students.

*'Of course, all events and initiatives under the European Youth Capital logo welcome international participants, too! It is our priority to keep the door open to everyone,'* added Lublin's team.

# Tiny houses

Are tiny houses a part of the solution to the housing crisis in the UK and in other countries in Europe and further afield? It is becoming increasingly difficult for young people, in their 20s and 30s, to be able to buy their own home. House prices in large cities have risen so much that it has almost **32a** ..... a generation from getting on the housing ladder.


Tiny houses are often about the same size as the containers we see on lorries and ships. They are often on wheels so they can be **33a** ..... by car to a new place if necessary. It is clearly an advantage that you would probably spend a fair bit less on building a tiny house in comparison to a standard sized house, but there is no getting away from the fact you'd be downsizing. Storage space would be needed urgently and an efficient approach to managing your daily life would definitely be **34a** ..... One distinct advantage is you would have less cleaning to do!

In all likelihood, your tiny home would be somewhat more basic, and you'd be saying goodbye to luxuries such as spacious kitchens, bathrooms and living space. Basic necessities like plumbing would be a challenge, but at least most of your utility bills would be **35a** ..... Not all tiny houses are necessarily as small or portable as the one in the photo above. Many are **36a** ..... without wheels and are used as studios or offices in gardens. One huge advantage, when building a smaller wooden home in the countryside or by the sea, is that you can enjoy being at one with nature. Built from sustainable wood, they offer flexibility and are eco-friendly.

### Hearing loss aids

## THE UNEXPECTED GUEST

Text A

I have met people who enjoy a channel crossing; men who can sit calmly in their deck chairs and, on arrival, wait until the boat is moored, then gather their belongings together without fuss and disembark. Personally, I can never manage this. From the moment I get on board I feel that the time is too short to settle down to anything.

I move my suitcases from one spot to another, and if I go down to the saloon for a meal, I bolt my food with an uneasy feeling that the boat may arrive unexpectedly whilst I am below. Perhaps all this is merely a legacy from one's short leaves in the war, when it seemed a matter of such importance to secure a place near the gangway, and to be amongst the first to disembark lest one should waste precious minutes of one's three or five days' leave.

On this particular July morning, as I stood by the rail and watched the white cliffs of Dover drawing nearer, I marvelled at the passengers who could sit calmly in their chairs and never even raise their eyes for the first sight of their native land. Yet perhaps their case was different from mine. Doubtless many of them had only crossed to Paris for the weekend, whereas I had spent the last year and a half on a ranch in the Argentine. I had prospered there, and my wife and I had both enjoyed the free and easy life of the South American continent, nevertheless it was with a lump in my throat that I watched the familiar shore draw nearer and nearer.

I had landed in France two days before, transacted some necessary business, and was now en route for London. I should be there some months—time enough to look up old friends, and one old friend in particular. A little man with an egg-shaped head and green eyes—Hercule Poirot! I proposed to take him completely by surprise. My last letter from the Argentine had given no hint of my intended voyage—indeed, that had been decided upon hurriedly as a result of certain business complications—and I spent many amused moments picturing to myself his delight and stupefaction on beholding me.

He, I knew, was not likely to be far from his headquarters. The time when his cases had drawn him from one end of England to the other was past. His fame had spread, and no longer would he allow one case to absorb all his time. He aimed more and more, as time went on, at being considered a “consulting detective”—as much a specialist as a Harley Street physician. He had always scoffed at the popular idea of the human bloodhound who assumed wonderful disguises to track criminals, and who paused at every footprint to measure it.

“No, my friend Hastings,” he would say, “we leave that to Giraud and his friends. Hercule Poirot's methods are his own. Order and method, and ‘the little grey cells.’ Sitting at ease in our own armchairs we see the things that these others overlook, and we do not jump to the conclusion like the worthy Japp.”

No; there was little fear of finding Hercule Poirot far afield.

On arrival in London, I deposited my luggage at a hotel and drove straight on to the old address. What poignant memories it brought back to me! I hardly waited to greet my old landlady “Enter, then,” cried a familiar voice from within.
